Thank you for your letter of 21December

We are required to operate within the constraints of a number of policies imposed on us by the Universal Music Group. One of those policies is that we are not permitted to reassign the rights in recordings which we own to third parties, even if the third party in question is a member of the relevant band.

At most, we may be permitted to enter into an agreement with the record company which will release the records, pursuant to which we would grant a limited duration (perhaps five years) licence in return for a reasonable advance and royalties sufficient to enable us to fulfill all of our royalty obligations to the artists (including all of the other members of the band as well as yourself) and to retain a reasonable margin. Before I would be permitted to enter into such an arrangement, however, I would need to obtain approval from a marketing point of view from my colleagues in our marketing department and I suggest, therefore, that it is probably premature at this stage for us to discuss the business affairs issues and it may be more appropriate for you to contact our marketing department.
